#### **Objective A: Outcome 1**

Engage personally with texts	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• engage with a range of increasingly complex language forms, features and structures of texts in meaningful, contextualised and authentic ways</li> <li>• analyse and explain how text structures, language features and visual features of texts and the context in which texts are experienced may influence audience response (ACELT1641)</li> </ul>
Develop and apply contextual knowledge	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• understand that Standard Australian English in its spoken and written forms has a history of evolution and change and continues to evolve (ACELA1550, ACELA1563)</li> <li>• analyse a range of texts that include the use of Aboriginal dialects and Aboriginal English</li> </ul>
Respond to and compose texts	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• create literary texts with a sustained 'voice', selecting and adapting appropriate text structures, literary devices, language, auditory and visual structures and features for a specific purpose and intended audience (ACELT1815)</li> <li>• compose and respond to a wide range of visual texts, eg picture books, graphic novels and films, using a range of appropriate techniques and metalanguage</li> <li>• use voice effects, eg tone, volume, pitch, pauses and change of pace, for specific effects such as arguing a point of view or attempting to persuade an audience to a course of action</li> </ul>

Engage personally with texts	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>investigate the ways different modes, subject areas, media and cultural representation affect their personal and critical responses to texts</li><li>create literary texts that reflect an emerging sense of personal style and evaluate the effectiveness of these texts (ACELT1814)</li><li>reflect on, extend, endorse or refute others' interpretations of and responses to literature (ACELT1634, ACELT1640)</li></ul>
Develop and apply contextual knowledge	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>critically respond to texts by drawing on knowledge of the historical context in which texts were composed through a program of wide reading and viewing</li><li>understand how language use can have inclusive and exclusive social effects, and can empower or disempower people (ACELA1551, ACELA1564)</li></ul>
Understand and apply knowledge of language forms and features	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>critically evaluate the ways bias, stereotypes, perspectives and ideologies are constructed in texts</li></ul>
Respond to and compose texts	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>respond to and compose a range of sustained imaginative, informative and persuasive texts which are increasingly demanding in terms of ideas, arguments and linguistic, structural, cognitive, emotional and moral complexity</li><li>formulate, develop and express their own ideas and beliefs creatively, thoughtfully, positively and confidently on issues such as sustainable patterns of living</li><li>pose increasingly perceptive and relevant questions, make logical predictions, draw analogies and challenge ideas and information as presented by others and in texts</li><li>understand and explain the ways in which composers transform ideas and experience into and within texts, including consideration of their insight, imaginative powers and ingenuity</li></ul>
